GATHERING (Mihimihi)

LIGHTING THE CANDLE (Kānara Whakamāmā)

God of the universe, you made light in the darkness.

The candle is lit

God of the universe you make our darkness light. Thank you. Remind me that you are warm and loving, that you call us to live in Your light.

CALL TO WORSHIP (Ngaa Kupu Whakapuuare)

When God appeared on earth in the person of Jesus, most of the world did not recognise him and therefore did not worship him. Today we ask for faith that will open our eyes to see Jesus for who he is, that we might worship him in truth.

PRAYER OF CONFESSION (Te Whaakinga Hara)

Loving God, we come to you in this Lenten season aware of our shortcomings. There have been times when we have stumbled and not done what we knew to be right. We have made choices that suited our immediate needs rather than the needs of our community, our family, and our world.

There have been other times when we did not care for ourselves as you would have us do, times we forgot how much you love us. Gracious God, there have been times when others have treated us badly, times when our love was answered with indifference or dismissal, times when people have not seen the beauty you have so lovingly created in us.

O God, we struggle to choose the right way when so many around us seem to be openly choosing the wrong way. We ask you to help us change what we can. Help us to examine within ourselves and consider how we can better reflect your image. Help us to understand the brokenness in those who hurt us, a brokenness that does not reflect their true image or perceive our true image. We ask you, O God, to remind us of how deeply you love us, even through the brokenness we feel. Amen.

WORDS OF ASSURANCE (Kupu Kī Pono)

John 9: 1, 6-9, 13-17, 33-34 (Inclusive Text) Sven Heger

Jesus went along and saw a man blind from birth. Jesus spat on the ground, made mud with the spittle, put this over the eyes of the blind man, and said, "Go and wash in the pool of Siloam'.

So the blind man went off and washed, and came away with sight restored.

The neighbours and people who earlier had seen him begging, said, 'Isn't this the one who used to sit and beg?' Some said, 'Yes, it is the same one.' Others said, 'No, he only looks like him.' The man said, 'I am the one...'

They brought the man who had been blind to the Pharisees. It had been a sabbath day when Jesus made the paste and opened the man's eyes, so when the Pharisees asked how he had come to see, he said, 'The one they call Jesus put paste on my eyes, and I washed and I can see.'

Then some of the Pharisees said, 'This Jesus can not be from God: he does not keep the sabbath.'

Others said, 'How could a sinner produce signs like this?' And there was disagreement among them.

So they spoke to the blind man again, 'What do you have to say about this Jesus yourself, now that he has opened your eyes?' 'He is a prophet', replied the man.

'Are you trying to teach us,' they replied, 'and you a sinner through and through, since you were born!' And they drove the man away.

PRAYERS FOR OTHERS (Ngaa Inoi mot e Whaanau)
