MINISTRY OF THE WORD (Ngaa Paanui Karaipiture)

Matthew 16: 13-20 (Inclusive Text)

When Jesus came into the district of Caesarea Philippi, he asked the disciples, 'Who do people say that the Chosen One is?'

And they said, 'Some say John the Baptist, but others Elijah, and still others Jeremiah or one of the prophets.'

Jesus said to them, 'But who do you say that I am?'

Simon Peter answered, 'You are the Messiah, the Firstborn of the living God.'

And Jesus answered, 'Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah! For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but the One in heaven who sent me.
