SO WHAT'S THE STORY ... INTRODUCTION

PREPARING ...?

We come now to prepare our hearts for the journey towards Christmas. This we symbolise in the preparation of a cake to be enjoyed at Christmas.

Various ingredients will be presented and added to the mixture. In just the same way, we different as we are, are blended together to be a community of faith.

As we approach Christmas once again, we must make ready. Many tasks must be done. The festive time will surely involve eating and drinking appreciating the good things provided.

So we thank God for all that nourishes us both physically and spiritually, individually and together as people of faith.

BUTTER AND SUGAR

Our first ingredients are butter and sugar, items of sweetness that reminds us of the psalmist's words: "How sweet are your words to my taste, sweeter than honey to my mouth"

Psalm 119: 103

Lord, may our lives too show a sweet character as we seek to live out qualities of love and caring; kindness and sharing.

Butter and sugar mixture are brought forward – the mixture is stirred as we sing the response.

ADDING THE EGGS

The eggs are brought forward – those who bring forward the eggs break them into the mixture and keep stirring.

Our next ingredient are the eggs. Eggs are more often associated with Easter than with Advent. They are a symbol of resurrection, of new life breaking forth from the tomb.

Therefore, these eggs remind us that death is not the end, that Christ brings light and hope in the midst of darkness and despair.

Reminding us that into the shadows of that Bethlehem night A glorious radiance shone for all to see.

We present these eggs, broken and added to our mixture, Recalling the words of hope declared by the prophet Isiah: "Then your light will break forth like the dawn and your healing will quickly appear." (*Isaiah 58:8a*)

Lord, may our lives reveal the risen Christ As we seek to follow his new and perfect way, offering ourselves in service.

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FLOUR AND WINE

Our next ingredients are flour and wine, as familiar to the people of Jesus' day as they are to us.

Flour reminds us of the prayer the Lord taught us in which we ask that our daily bread might be provided. We also recall that Christ himself was known as the "Bread of life' and that feeding from him our lives can be full.

Bring forward the flour and wine. Flour is sieved in first and stirred. Then the wine is added to the mixture and stirred.

We present this flour and wine, symbols of another meal held in an Upper Room many years ago. As Jesus shared these elements he offered for us his body and blood.

Lord thank you for that last supper and for the fact that we can still experience your presence whenever we celebrate Holy Communion.

MIXED FRUIT

Our ingredients are dried fruit and nuts, also common in biblical days. This mixture reminds us of those dry times we can experience when God seems rather remote and distant.

The hardness of nuts also reveals something about us at times, the fact that our hearts can become hard when we fail to live in harmony with each other.

We present this mixed fruit and in doing so seek forgiveness for our faults. We are sorry for selfish thoughts and actions and ask for your help to live as we should.

Dried fruit and nuts are brought forward – the fruit is stirred into the mixture. Keep stirring continuously.

Recognising that these ingredients, while small, are each important to the final taste and texture. Help us to realise that it is often the little things that we do, or don't do, that make the biggest difference in our lives.

MARMALADE, SPICES AND ESSENCE

We also present marmalade and spices, with their different tastes and flavours. Reminding us of the variety of people who make up our church community.

Lord, may we take pleasure in the fact that we are each unique and different.

Marmalade and spices are brought forward – people keep stirring the mixture as we continue to hold the service. Once everyone has stirred the mixture – the mixture is covered.
